DID YOU KNOW?

Roy Ivor was an environmentalist before the term was invented.

We want to thank Gene Schuster for sending this article our way. It's a definite must read, if you haven't already. Below is a great blog article about The long and winding lane to Roy Ivor's legacy.

The self-taught bird expert, who moved into the forest just east of Sawmill Creek north of Dundas St. near the current main entrance to UTM with his mother to set up a bird rescue and rehabilitation centre in 1928, wrote numerous articles for nature magazines over the years, including National Geographic.

Among those pieces was a warning about the likely negative effects of pesticides on birds published more than a decade before Rachel Carson's famous book on DDT, Silent Spring, which came out in 1962.

Despite the fact that he had no formal educational training in ornithology, Ivor became renowned for his ability to nurse birds back to health from injury and to establish relations with them that made them seem like pets, rather than wild animals.

His meticulous observations of nesting and feeding habits fed his reputation, as did his expertise in the strange ritual of "anting." Some birds catch ants and get real pleasure in rubbing them against their wings and tails. Ivor's article titled The Enigma of Bird Anting ("With 21 illustrations, 15 in natural colours") appeared in National Geographic 60 years ago last month.

He was featured regularly in the popular press, which cemented his reputation as a bird whisperer. You don't forget a photo of a chickadee sitting on a man's pipe while he prepares to light it. Or a reporter's description of a grateful robin, whom Ivor had nursed back to health, bringing him a worm in gratitude.

Or a hawk, with a bad wing, hopping around after his "doctor" as if he were the Pied Piper. In a Sept. 18, 1968 column about Ivor in The South Peel Weekly, (datelined Erindale) reporter Don Edwards described how a series of wire cages that held injured birds were connected to a flyway directly to the house's porch. Thus the literal title of the memoir Ivor published that year, I Live With Birds.

"One of the hawks," wrote Edwards, "will let Ivor into the large cage, sit on his hand and even take a piece of food from between his lips. No one else dare set foot into this enclosure since the hawk makes it crystal clear that other visitors are not welcome."

Ivor's Winding Lane Bird Sanctuary, named for the narrow path that snaked its way from two stone pillars that stood at its entrance on Mississauga Rd., was the forerunner of the many successful citizen-led animal rescue operations we now take for granted.

Like many of them, he spent a lot more time on the birds than on the finances. A devastating 1970 fire destroyed his home and almost wiped him out. Only three birds survived. A fundraising campaign, which included a big rally at Huron Park, raised more than \$40,000 and put Winding Lane back on his feet. Sherway resident Irene Gabon, who was a freelance stringer for The Globe and Mail at the time, remembers sneaking into Ivor's hospital room with Toronto Star reporter Frank Calleja to interview Ivor, whose eyes were bandaged because of smoke damage.

Alzheimer's disease was already taking its toll on the Order of Canada recipient. "All he wanted to talk about was his birds," said Gabon. But then, that was always the case.

He returned to Winding Lane for a few more years before Alzheimer's forced him into a Streetsville nursing home. He died Dec. 10, 1979, three days before his 100th birthday. His long-time assistant Bernice Inman-Emery carried on his work until 2005 when she was also diagnosed with Alzheimer's.

Like her mentor, she inspired great trust in her patients. When members of a local writers' group met at her place, members would read while Inman-Emery fed a baby bird or raccoon on her lap.

After she died in Jan. 2009, friend Diana Aspin told News reporter Julie Slack that "at one of our first meetings, she took a handful of mice from the freezer, microwaved them to perfection and lay them in a lectern. She then screeched to an owl nesting at Erindale College. In it swooped, scooping up the mice with its enormous talons and took off."

The City bought most of the sanctuary property in 1987 when Steve Mahoney was councillor. Erin Mills Developments also donated a portion of Sawmill Valley land. After Inman-Emery's property was sold to a developer in 2008, the City bought it back, thanks largely to the efforts of Councillor Katie Mahoney. There have long been plans to officially acknowledge the Winding Lane work, a task Councillor Matt Mahoney may now have inherited.

DID YOU KNOW? CONTD.

The crumbling chimney of Ivor's house is the only thing left of the sanctuary. The Winding Lane work should be remembered by more than a local street name, a UTM student residence building and the Ivor Woodlands subdivision sign on The Collegeway.

Ivor is buried at the Cosmopolitan Union Cemetery, located behind St. Peter's Anglican Church on the hill across the road from that sign.

Gabon well recalls the frigid December day of his funeral.

"It was very cold up on top of the hill," she says. "A sparrow chirped as the casket was lowered."


